

Kia ora e te whānau,

We will continue to expect teaching to be of the highest standard and these initiatives and areas of growth are all focussed on bringing us to a place where we live our learning. Where students have a clear understanding of themselves and who they are, their place, (turangawaewae) and an idea of the pathway into adulthood that is beyond school.

Rodney Jackson leaves us for Northern Southland College to take up the role of Assistant Principal and Zara Heath is taking a change of direction and is going to be teaching at the Southern Health School. I would like to acknowledge Yvonne Cunningham for her commitment to our Year 7 and 8 learners, she brought with her a wealth of experience and knowledge, I am sure you are all with me in wishing Yvonne the very best.

I would like to thank our Board of Trustees who work tirelessly for our school, this year I acknowledge our outgoing board as well as our new board. The responsibility of Governance is both complex and demanding, I admire and thank those of you who put your hand up to undertake it.

The year has belonged to our students. For those year 7s and new students who have shone throughout the year, a particular congratulations. You have arrived at a new school and given it your all. Keep striving for success, the future of our school looks very bright indeed.


On that final note, I would like to wish everyone an absolutely brilliant Christmas, an awesome holiday and great family times.










Taster Day Year 10


After we finished the walk, we went to the hot pools and they were amazing!! They were nearly too hot!!
