




### Kiwi Competitions – Years 7–10



#### Ngā Manu Korero

Ngā Manu Kōrero is regarded as one of the most esteemed events on the Te Ao Māori calendar. It is the largest speech competition of it's kind whereby rangatahi speak on the successes of, and challenges facing Māori today. Our very own Latoya Columbus shares her story from this year's regional competition in Dunedin:

"Kia ora, my name is Toya Columbus, and I'm a student at Aparima College. Ngā Manu Kōrero is a national speech competition that celebrates Te Reo Māori, public speaking, and the voices of rangatahi across Aotearoa. Being one of the few chosen to stand and represent my school was an honour. It was a humbling but empowering experience to share my speech, express my whakaaro, and stand proud as a young Māori. I'm truly grateful for the opportunity to be part of such a meaningful kaupapa. One of the most amazing parts of the experience was listening to all the other speakers. Each one brought something unique to the stage, with powerful kōrero, passion, and confidence that was truly inspiring. I felt proud to be among such talented and courageous tauira."



Latoya placed 2nd in the Korimako Senior English Prepared section, a significant achievement considering the fierce competition from every major school across Southland and Otago. Toya's speech topic was "the last beacon of light that will never fade" which made reference to our tūpuna and how we carry the light of Te Ao Māori within us. Her speech was very well received by the judges and audience at Dunedin Town Hall - me poho kererū Latoya, we couldn't be more proud!

### **Bus Safety Reminders – Student Safety**

Reminders for parents and caregivers:

Caregivers are responsible for safely transporting their children to and from their school bus stop and as such are best placed to decide the safest way to do this.

- Stick to the speed limit: it's 20kph when passing a stopped school bus (on either side of the road).
- Drop your tamariki off on the same side of the road as the bus stop.
- Teach your tamariki to always get out of the car on the side closest to the curb.
- Always take your tamariki to and from the bus-stop.
- Teach your tamariki not to run across the road.
- Remind your tamariki on how to keep safe boarding and disembarking the bus:
- While waiting at the bus stop, keep well back from the road.
- Wait until the bus has completely stopped and the door opens before getting on.
- After getting off the bus, stand well back from the road and wait until the bus has gone and you can see clearly before moving.


